Side by Side Family Centre

Orange Shirt Day

September, 30

Orange Shirt Day is a legacy of the St. Joseph Mission (SJM) residential school commemoration event held in Williams Lake, BC, Canada, in the spring of 2013. It grew out of the account of a young girl, Phyllis, having her shiny new orange shirt taken away on her first day of school at the Mission. This has provided us with an opportunity to keep the discussion on all aspects of residential schools happening annually. The date was chosen because it is the time of year in which children were taken from their homes to residential schools, and because it is an opportunity to set the stage for the continued creation of a safe, equitable and inclusive school environment as the school year begins. Orange Shirt Day is also an opportunity for First Nations, local governments, schools and communities to come together in the spirit of reconciliation and hope for generations of children to come.

On this day, we wear orange to remember the experiences of former students of Residential Schools and to commit to ongoing reconciliation.



Safe Schools Report Bullying Now

The DDSB works with its school communities to prevent bullying in our schools. Bullying is unacceptable.

Report Bullying Now was created to provide students, parents and community members the opportunity to report bullying at their school through the internet.

All DDSB school websites and the board's site have a button on them which reads "Report Bullying Now". Anyone can click on this link and report bullying.

At Williamsburg, we are committed to providing a positive school environment for everyone. Our staff implement a number of proactive strategies to prevent incidences of bullying. If bullying does occur, it is important that it is reported to school

staff. The sooner trusted adults intervene, the more quickly situations can be resolved.



Anaphylaxis and Allergies

WPS has several children with allergies in classrooms throughout the school. As such, we are a Nut Aware building. Please read the information sent home by the classroom teachers if there are immediate concerns in your child's classroom. We are collecting updated medical information now from families to ensure our records are accurate. Staff do training each year to ensure all are familiar with emergency procedures and how to use Epi-Pens and Allerjects correctly. Do not hesitate to ask questions if you require further information. STUDENT DROP OFF AND PICK UP

Thank you for following the procedures WPS has put in place for the safe arrival and dismissal of all students at the school. This is always a priority and during the pandemic new steps have been put in place to help us all remain safe. Please remember the only Kiss N Ride loop is located a the front of the school during morning arrival. Students can exit the vehicle, and then walk through the opening at the primary yard to go to their designated class line-up spot. At the end of the day, the loop is closed to allow parents/guardians to meet the primary students in that space to head home for the day. COVID-19 What to do if my child is sick and was not exposed to a known case?

All children, students, visitors, or staff must screen for COVID-19 every day before going to school or childcare. Use the school and childcare screening tool which can be found at https://covid-19.ontario.ca/school-screening/

The screening tool will let you know if your child should be attending school or childcare or not. It will also let you know if your child should isolate and get tested.

What are the symptoms of COVID-19?

Fever and/or chills

• Temperature of 37.8 degrees Celsius/100 degrees Fahrenheit or higher

Cough

• New or worsening (e.g. continuous, more than usual if chronic cough), including croup (barking cough, making a whistling noise when breathing)

Shortness of breath

 Out of breath, unable to breathe deeply, wheeze that is worse than usual if chronically short of breath (not related to other known causes or conditions such as asthma, chronic heart failure, etc.)

New decreased or loss of taste or smell

• Not related to other known causes or conditions (e.g. seasonal allergies, neurological disorders, etc.)

Nausea, vomiting, diarrhea

• Not related to other known causes or conditions (e.g. transient vomiting due to anxiety in children, irritable bowel syndrome, etc.)

What do I do if my child has symptoms?

If your child is sick, they should stay home. If they are having symptoms of COVID-19, they should be tested and isolate while awaiting test results or until they receive an alternative diagnosis from a health care provider.

Household members of the sick child are required to self isolate until the child receives a negative COVID-19 test result or are provided with an alternative diagnosis by a healthcare professional. However, if the household members are asymptomatic and fully vaccinated or previously positive within the past 90 days, they are not required to self isolate.

How can I get my child tested?

You can book an appointment for COVID-19 testing in Durham Region by completing the online assessment form at <u>covidswab.lh.ca</u> or <u>https://covid-19.ontario.ca/assessment-centre-locations</u>.

If any members of your household test positive for COVID-19, you will be contacted by Public Health directly with more detailed advice.

When can my child return to school or childcare?

If your child has not been exposed to COVID-19 and you get a negative result, or a known alternative diagnosis from a healthcare provider, they can return to school or childcare once fever free and symptoms are resolving for 24 hours or 48 hours for gastrointestinal symptoms (e.g. nausea, vomiting or diarrhea).
